McLaren Vale (Approx. 45 minutes from Adelaide)

Renowned for its bold reds and Mediterranean varietals. A car is recommended, or you can book a tour.

Must-visit wineries: Bekkers, Primo Estate, Samuel's Gorge, Chapel Hill, Alpha Box & Dice, Chalk Hill.

Dining: The Salopian Inn offers an outstanding culinary experience.

Unique experience: Visit the d'Arenberg Cube, an avant-garde cellar door and art gallery.

Coastal stop: Aldinga Beach is worth a visit, especially in warmer weather.







Barossa Valley (Approx. 60 minutes from Adelaide)

Renowned for its bold reds and Mediterranean varietals. A car is recommended, or you can book a tour.

Famous for full-bodied red wines, particularly Shiraz, with standout Rieslings from the nearby Eden Valley.

Must-visit wineries: Rockford, Penfolds, St Hugo, Seppeltsfield, Chateau Tanunda.







Adelaide Hills (Approx. 30 minutes from Adelaide)

The closest wine region to the city, offering a mix of wine and gin experiences.

Must-visit wineries: Shaw and Smith, Goldwing Wines, Longview Vineyard.

Gin distilleries: Ambleside Distillers.

Dining recommendations:

Sidewood Estate, Pike & Joyce, Scenic Hotel, and Crafers Hotel.

Cultural stop: Hahndorf, a picturesque German settlement town

Port Lincoln – A short 30– minute flight (or 8–hour drive) offering world–class seafood. Experience the Coffin Bay oyster tour or, for the adventurous, shark cage diving.

Yorke Peninsula – Particularly
Innes National Park, featuring
picturesque beaches and
rugged coastal scenery.







Kangaroo Island – Accessible by ferry from southern South Australia. Known for its wildlife, excellent food, and renowned wineries.
