Pathways to Adelaide University

Selection Rank (ATAR plus adjustment factors)

If your child has qualified for the South Australian Certificate of Education (SACE) or holds an equivalent recent year 12 qualification, including the International Baccalaureate Diploma (IB), and has achieved a competitive Selection Rank, they can use this as a pathway into university.

Your child's Selection Rank (ATAR plus any applicable adjustment factors) will be used to compete for a place in a university degree.

For the majority of our undergraduate degrees, your child must not have completed more than 2 years full-time equivalent university study (48 units) to use their year 12 results.

Some degrees take additional factors into account as well as, or instead of, your child's ATAR - such as auditions, the University Clinical Aptitude Test (UCAT), oral interviews, etc.

Guaranteed Entry

Allows your child to choose their preferences with confidence.

We offer Guaranteed Entry for most undergraduate degrees. There's no need for your child to complete a separate application. They'll be automatically considered when they list their preferred Adelaide University degree as their highest preference.

ATAR based

Your child will be eligible for an ATAR-based Guaranteed Entry place when they:

- Achieve an ATAR (including adjustment factors) that is equal to or higher than the Guaranteed Entry score
- Meet any admissions criteria for their degree, for example a subject prerequisite.

Subject based

Did your child achieve solid grades in year 12, but didn't get the ATAR they were expecting? They'll be eligible for a Subject based Guaranteed Entry place when they:

- Complete SACE (or equivalent) and have an ATAR of 50 or higher (not including adjustment factors)
- Utilise their best three grades from 20-credit subjects
- Meet any additional admissions criteria such as subject prerequisites.

If your child didn't achieve grades for guaranteed entry, they will still be considered on a competitive basis for available places in their preferred degree.





STAT (Skills for Tertiary Admissions Test)

If your child hasn't completed year 12 or any other higher education, they may wish to use the Skills for Tertiary Admissions Test (STAT) to gain entry to university. The STAT is a two-hour, multiple-choice test designed to assess a range of skills and knowledge needed to study at university.

The Australian Council for Educational Research (ACER) coordinates the STAT. To sit the test, your child will need to be over 18 years old before 1 February in the year that they wish to commence study. If your child has been enrolled at university in the last two years, they must not have completed more than two years (full-time) tertiary study in total. For more information, visit:

Higher Education GPA (Grade Point Average)

If your child has already completed at least six months (full-time) of a recognised higher education degree at a recognised higher education institution, they can use their Grade Point Average (GPA) to gain entry to Adelaide University.

Internal transfer

Perhaps your child gained entry into a degree that was not their first preference or, after completing a few courses, have changed their mind about what they'd like to study. Your child can use their GPA (or any eligible previous qualifications) to apply for what is called an internal transfer. This is an option available to students who may have already started studying in one degree and, for a range of different reasons, would like to transfer into another degree at the same university. Please note that not all degrees are available via internal transfer. If unsure, you can contact our friendly student advisors for assistance.

Vocational Education and Training (VET) Studies (Certificate IV or higher)

Has your child completed a VET qualification at a Certificate IV or higher level? Their completed qualification can gain them entry to many of our degrees.

For students that have studied at either TAFE SA or other Registered Training Organisations (RTOs), most Certificate IV courses (including former Advanced Certificates or equivalent) meet the minimum entry requirements for a wide range of our undergraduate degrees. In some instances, a successfully completed Diploma or Advanced Diploma will be required to meet the minimum entry requirements.

Differences between school and university

It's likely that your child has spent the last few years of their education in familiar surroundings, with their tasks assigned and explained by teachers they know well.

They will have received regular feedback on their progress and a sense of belonging to a clearly defined, supportive and structured learning community.

At university, students are treated as adults who are responsible for their own work and time management. Class sizes are larger, and the learning environment is less structured than school.

This increase in responsibility may feel like a big change compared to school. It's normal and expected for your child to take some time to adjust to these aspects of university life.

Workload

At university, each academic year is typically broken into two main study periods (also known as semesters). One semester is usually around 12 or 13 weeks long. Below is a breakdown of the workload expected of students in an average semester.

WEEKS	WORKLOAD
1 to 5	Workload starts at an introductory pace and assessments commence.Usually one assessment per subject.
6 to 7 (includes 2-week teaching break)	 Workload increases around this time One assessment per subject. Assessments increase in both size and value.
8 - 13 (includes swot vac and exams)	 Workload increases again. Final assessment or exam, which is generally the largest in size and value.

Study load

Study load refers to the amount of time your child will be expected to dedicate to their studies. If your child is studying full-time, this means they will study four courses per semester. Some students choose to study part-time, allowing them to balance study with other commitments. Please note, there are some degrees which can only be completed full-time.

A full-time study commitment is made up of contact and non-contact time, and the specific time commitment required will vary between courses.

Contact time is the time your child spends in organised teaching sessions, mainly lectures and tutorials, although some courses will also include laboratory practicals, fields trips and clinical/work placements.

Non-contact time is spent studying at home or in the library, completing assignments, preparing for tutorials and revising for tests and exams.



Setting up for success

How to apply

Applications open in early August for study commencing in the following year. Your child can apply for their chosen degrees through the SATAC website.

Before they apply, it's a good idea for your child to familiarise themselves with the application process. This includes things like key dates and deadlines for applications, as well as SATAC fees and charges and when to pay. For more information, visit the SATAC website: satac.edu.au

For our 100% online degrees applications will open in July. Your child can apply directly to AU online.



University study tips

- Attend classes regularly.
- Develop academic and social networks with other students.

- Be engaged during tutorials and participate in online forums.
- Complete internships, placements, an overseas exchange or international study tour.
- Read assessment details carefully and submit them on time.
- Learn from feedback provided by markers.
- Be organised and balance extracurricular activities.
- Stay healthy by exercising regularly and getting enough sleep to minimise stress.

Money matters

There is a range of help available to help your child manage the financial costs of studying at university.

Commonwealth supported places

Commonwealth supported places are available in all undergraduate degrees studied at Adelaide University. A Commonwealth supported place is subsidised by the Australian Government. This means a portion of the full cost of your child's studies is paid for by the government. For the remaining portion (the student contribution), your child has the option to either pay this up front or defer payment by requesting a HECS-HELP loan.

HECS-HELP is an Australian Government scheme to help students in a Commonwealth supported place to pay their student contribution. Australian citizens and holders of Permanent Humantarian visas are eligible. In utilising a HECS-HELP loan, students require a TFN (Tax File Number). This loan is then managed through the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). For more information on HECS-HELP, visit: <u>studyassist.gov.au</u>

Student support payments

Centrelink, on behalf of the Australian Government, provides financial assistance to full-time students (and, to a lesser degree, part-time students) with approved circumstances. Scholarships

Scholarships and grants are available to both new and continuing students. Scholarships are not only for high achievers – they are also available to provide your child with an equal opportunity to study at university, no matter where you live or what your financial situation might be.
